II. Basic Course Description

The course introduces the student to modern linguistic theory and the questions that it addresses. It presents the five basic levels of linguistic analysis, namely morphology, phonetics, phonology, syntax, and semantics, and the standard analysis tools used in each level. The idea of "grammar" as the representation of linguistic competence is emphasized.

III. Objectives

This course presents linguistics as a science where theories are evaluated by confrontation with data. Whenever possible, the students will be required to identify generalizations in data sets, build hypotheses to capture these generalizations, and then test their hypotheses against further data. English will provide most of the data, but other languages will also be used to enhance the students' analytic skills.

IV. Teaching methods

- 1. Lectures encouraging the participation of students.
- 2. In-class analysis of data sets.
- 3. In-class correction of exercises.
